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
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President's Corner

Why would Kurt Furstenau want to organize a Porsche Club drive to Ajo, Arizona? Ajo (pronounced a-ho) is Spanish for garlic and the town is in a remote part of Arizona's Sonoran Desert. It is miles from anywhere. The town did have a major open pit copper mine but it closed in 1985 and half of the town's population left.

Maybe because it is the nearest place to stay and eat if you are visiting Organ Pipe National Monument, 26 miles away, which was on our agenda.

On Saturday, April 1st, 2023, Kurt led a group of 23 Porsches and one BMW to Ajo to find out. From the start at Burger King on Ajo Road Tucson, we journeyed to Sells on the Tohono O'odham Reservation then to Why, Arizona. There you turn left for Organ Pipe Monument, right for Ajo.

The roadside was covered with flowers.

By the way, the name Ajo is also derived from Tohono word "au-auho" for body paint. Tribal members had found red oxide copper material on the surface that made good pigment.

We entered Ajo passing between large mine tailings to find a pretty community of well -kept, glistening white,



buildings and a Spanish Colonial style Plaza. We checked into our rooms at the Sonoran Desert Inn. They were large, nicely furnished, and comfortable. Oh yes, there were no TVs so you could enjoy a different ambience.

After lunch at the Inn, we headed south through Why to Organ Pipe National Monument. Many members did a trail walk through the unique cacti while others listened to a Ranger talk about the Intelligence of Ravens. Later on, social hour was sitting in front of our rooms chatting with our neighbors. The Inn's chef presented a nice dinner of pork loin and apple sauce.





The pit of the New Cornelia Mine sits above Ajo like a sleeping coyote, waiting to stretch its legs and run again. It is only on inactive status. It is more than ½ mile wide and 750 feet deep. A spring-fed pool is green from copper compounds. Viewpoints are around the edge and there is a nice, small museum manned by volunteers.



At one time the New Cornelia was the largest open-pit copper mine in Arizona. It opened in 1917 and was put to slumber in 1985 during a time of labor unrest and poor prices for copper. The copper minerals were first mined by Spanish explorers. Then in the mid-19th century a syndicate out of San Francisco shipped high-grade ore by oxcart to San Diego where it went by ship around Cape Horn to be smelted in Swansea, Wales. This proved to be unprofitable.

In the 1890s, St. Louis investors A.J. Shotwell and John Boddie organized the St. Louis Copper Co. It was reorganized in 1900 and named the New Cornelia Copper Co. after Boddie's first wife.

The mine was not successful until 1911 when the Calumet and Arizona Copper Co. from Bisbee bought 70% of the stock. They brought in visionary mining engineer John Campbell Greenway and metallurgist Louis Ricketts. They built a successful extraction plant and found an excellent water supply a few miles north of Ajo. A rail line was built to the North that connected to the Southern Pacific at Gila Bend. The Cornelia open pit copper mine was the first in Arizona, starting in September 1917, just a few days before the Sacramento pit mine opened in Bisbee. The blasted rocks were scooped up by large steam shovels and taken to the surface in ore cars pulled by steam locomotives.

From 1914 until 1985 Ajo was the model "Company Town." Greenway had a Minneapolis architecture firm lay out the town design in a line from A Mountain, next to the New Cornelia Pit, down the hill to the train station. There were dorms and houses for the workers, stores, restaurant, bank, theater, and a hospital. From the train station, a Plaza, with arches on 3 sides, was the entrance to the city center. The Ajo Federated and Immaculate Conception Churches were built here, all were in whitewashed Spanish Colonial Style. Then in 1918 the Curley (High) School, named for Superintendent Michael Curley, was finished higher up the slope.



The completed design resembles a bird with its wings unfurled. The Plaza is the body and heart, the Curley School is the head and the streets angling past the school form the wings with districts where the workers lived.

Following the mine closure in 1985, half of the population left. Many of the buildings were sold. The hospital closed and Ajo went into a serious decline.

Now Ajo is thriving as a major Art Center with help of the International Sonoran Desert Alliance, or ISDA. The ISDA is a non-profit corporation formed in 1993 by a coalition of leaders from the Tohono O'odham Nation, the Ajo area, Pima County and northern Sonora, Mexico. The ISDA works to preserve and enhance the environment, culture, and economies of Sonoran desert communities.

The ISDA took control of the Plaza and bought the Curley School and the Elementary School by using a variety of grants and other funding sources. The grade school had rooms on four sides facing a central garden area. These were turned into beautiful motel rooms forming the Sonoran Desert Inn and Conference Center.

The Curley School was remodeled in 2007 into 31 affordable artist lofts. It now houses a painter, a musician, a potter, a jeweler, one who produces hand-made paper and others. The Plaza now boasts art and pottery stores, a coffee roaster and other thriving shops.

On Sunday morning the SAR group had delicious quiche for breakfast. We then took a walking tour escorted by Isaac, an Ajo native. We stopped in front of the Curley School where he talked about growing up in Ajo, his memories of going to school there, and of recent changes that has made Ajo a great place to live. The population is around 3,000 and is increasing. The town has many winter visitors and housing is improving. We all smiled for a group photo on the steps.



We toured the Plaza, stopped at the train station and ended up in Artists Alley. Every other year the Ajo Street Art Project invites artists from all over to come and paint their own mural in the Alley. As a result, murals have bloomed all over town adding to its beauty.

Finally, it was time to say goodbye to Ajo and we thank Kurt for bringing us here to discover this "Jewel in the Sonoran Desert."

If you are having issues updating your National PCA profile, just send me an email and I will help you get it resolved. Often it is an easy fix.

You can update your profile. Here is how: If your options are correct, you or your email provider may have marked your mail as Spam or Junk and reported it to PCA. If that occurs, it must be changed at the national level. Send me an email and I will forward it to membership for you.

There is NO "Members only login" for individuals. You do not want to know how often I receive emails asking me or telling me their national password will not work on our page. It's not supposed to work. You receive the password with each *ZN* announcement.

Since January 1st, 2023, many email service providers have enabled their spam blockers. An email whitelist is an approved list of senders you and your readers clearly define to ensure your email service provider (ESP) doesn't block and/or mark your content as spam. Internet Service Providers (ISPs) have several spam blockers built into their programming. **SEVERAL club members have stopped receiving communications from us due to this.** If you are not receiving our emails, please check your PCA profile to ensure you have not prohibited National or Regional communications. If you are still not receiving our emails and you want them, email me at <u>membership@pcasar.org</u> and let me know. ONLY National can reinstate your mail privileges.

How to Whitelist in gmail

- 1. Click the gear icon in Gmail and select "See all settings" from the Quick settings menu.
- 2. Navigate to "Filters and Blocked Addresses" in the top menu.
- 3. Select "Create a new filter." ...
- 4. Add a specific email or a whole domain in the "From" field. ...

- 6. Check "Never send it to Spam" in the checkbox.

- 5. Select to send all mail to "Inbox."
- 6. Save your settings.


A few years prior to COVID, Mary Jane and I joined our fellow club member, Carol Cloutier, in a walking group. We would meet at various locations along the loop and


















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
