

PCA Treffen-at-Sea Western Caribbean

Getting to the port from our hotel, which we were told is generally a 15-minute shuttle ride, however, some shuttle drivers took almost an hour or more to make one round trip from our hotel to the port and back. Needless to say, the shuttle schedule was behind on

Becoming an annual event is the die-cast concours (since actual cars on the ship is a bit difficult for any type of concours) as well as many other activities for the sea-days. Much like Parade, there was lots to do besides the ship's "regular" entertainment package. PCA began the week with a Pirelli welcome social, held special dinners, night entertainment, a comedy show, musical trivia and even a Casino night. There

was a door decoration competition, the 80's fashion show and dance, movies under the stars (Racing with Giants), Porsche (radio-controlled cars) racing in the Piazza (center ship) and even an ugly sweater contest for our last night with the farewell reception. (Snowman is Vu Nguyen, PCA's Executive Director he really gets into the fun of it!)



We all selected our own tours, some together and some separate from the others. PCA had some of the Princess scheduled tours specifically tagged "PCA-Treffen" and had its own tour numbers ending with Porsche model numbers, 990, 991, 992, etc. We thought that by signing up for the "PCA-Treffen" tour would mean a bus load of just Porsche people. Wrong. We were mixed with other non-Porsche members of this cruise, although many of the buses/ shuttles we were on had a lot of other Porsche members – obvious with the PCA lanyards many of us were wearing with the Princess medallion.

Greg and I selected a tour at each port. Our first tour took us to the Xunantinich Mayan Ruins in Belize. In this part of the world, there are many Mayan Ruins to be found and each has their own history of how they came to be. Some of these temple ruins permit climbing which Greg did while I waited at the base for his return and moving on to another temple



in the ruins. Climbing the actual ruins is not as easy as they may seem. Some climbed using "all fours" and some required large step climbs. No handrails and no man-made steps.

In Roatan, we went to the Gumbalimba Preservation Nature Park. This was the highlight of my tour because it had free-flying macaws and white-faced



capuchins (monkeys) that like sitting on your shoulder or head as well as "borrowing" your sunglasses or unzipping your backpack or purse if one brought it along to this part of the tour. Many of us locked our backpacks in a rental locker provided at the sanctuary. These were two of the main highlights of this sanctuary as well as a re-creation

Our next stop was Costa Maya (Mahahual) where we and the Tillers toured the Chacchoben Ruins.

Many of these ruins we toured have similarities but each ruin site is different from the other, besides being in a different country.





PCA-SAR OVERNIGHT ESCAPE TO THE CHIRICAHUA NATIONAL MONUMENT

Project Corner New Year, New Plan/Parts is Parts

Some of you gentle readers may be wondering, "What is going on with the FrankenPorsche? Did it get pushed aside for some of the other projects?" Well, yes, and no.



Yes, the 911/FrankenPorsche (Frank) did get pushed sideways – physically sideways. The chassis has been pushed over to another part of the shop. With the new year, the main focus is on the motor and securing parts. And space was needed for...



The 356 project (Mimi) that is actively having all possible parts removed. While time ran short, the repainting became more involved. This year, everything will be removed, and the body, doors, and lids will get chemically stripped. The plan is to have everything ready for painting in the warmer months as our painter has found paint works better in the heat.

And the 944 S2 race car (Thumbelina) needs attention, which requires more space for crawling around and under. Now there's room to resolve Thumbelina's problems with starting, and prep for racing season.

Swapping Parts on Thumbelina

A frustrating hunt for the problem keeping the 944 S2 race car from starting continues. This all started when the motor would not start to leave impound/awards after a SCCA race in Pueblo, Colorado. The folks I race with were amazing and went above and beyond trying to help get me back on the track. At the end of the day, I decided to dig deeper into the problem. I had to bring the car home.

At this point, the fuel pump has been checked and changed, the fuel filter replaced, and the pressure regulator replaced. The test gauges show that there is sufficient fuel pressure in the system, but still no luck starting.

There are three things needed to make the motor run: air/ fuel mixture to ignite, compression to prepare the mix to ignite, and spark to ignite it. As the engine was running very nicely in the race just before, and I found no gaping holes, I figured compression is sufficient.

Checking the ignition with a timing light, and inspecting spark plugs, I believe there is sufficient spark to ignite the air/fuel mixture. However, while I have sufficient pressure in the fuel system, I have not proven that the fuel getting out the injectors. Not wanting to make a huge mess with fuel spraying all over, I have not pulled the injectors to see them spray. But I can check that the signals are getting to the injectors so they can do their job.

The DME - the computer that controls the fuel injection, and some of the spark is another point of failure. However, having swapped the DME for another that I happened to have, with the same results, this seems unlikely to be the problem.

Next up is the fuse box. It contains most of the fuses and relays needed to make the motor run. After looking at everything else, and getting some funny connections in the fuse box, I now have another fuse box to try. Hopefully, this will finally solve the problem.


Taking a deeper look at the motor for the FrankenPorsche, there are a few parts that need upgrading. Obviously, the studs that hold the heads and cylinders onto the motor need replacing, as two turned up busted before ever cracking the case.

Once inside the case, most of the parts looked much better than the outside the motor. One exception was the oil pump. It turns out the magnesium used on some oil pumps crumbles over time. This is a good part to replace.

When looking for an oil pump, I learned that, with minor changes (such as changing the cover on the bottom of the model), most of the oil pumps used with the 911 motors are interchangeable! This allows an upgrade which will be able to handle the extra long run to the oil cooler and the oil tank.

Pulling Parts Off Mimi

The 356, Mimi, has been stripped down, all the parts pulled off her, and is getting ready for a chemical dip to remove everything down to bare metal.

When removing parts there a couple of things that come to mind. First, taking everything off the car isn't as easy as it first sounds. You want to get everything off, but you must take care so you don't harm anything that might be rebuilt and reused. And second, at some point, you will need to put a good number of the very parts you are removing back on to the car. So, be sure to keep track of what goes where! 

I went to Folmer Porsche (in Pomona, CA) about a week later and ordered my own 944 (in Guards Red, of course). With waiting lists and allocation issues it took almost a year to come in. In April 1983 I drove my new wheels out to West Lake Village and drove that canyon road down to Malibu on a sunny Spring Day. The road was outstanding, the weather was great, my new vehicle was perfect and I had a terrific time. It's been etched into my memory for 40 years now. It was what owning a Porsche is about.


