Most people in the Porsche club have been participants in some event that stood out for being exceptional. Exceptional in size, historical perspective, or mere beauty. Parades, Holidays, Escapes, Rennsports, Treffens and Werks Reunions have provided opportunities to attend those memorable times in one's Porsche life.

About 10 years ago, a couple of Porsche people decided to begin a new event called Luftgekuhlt. The literal translation is "air cooled." Car shows have, for the most

part, been limited to having cars all lined up in rows, often divided into "classes" for competition purposes. Seeing all the cars was easy in that you walked up and down the rows.

"Luft," as it has become known, was begun by Patrick Long, a very famous factory race driver representing Porsche all over the world. Another originator was Howie Idelson, a Southern California creative director. Later, Jeff Zwart became involved. He is wellknown for his Pikes Peak ascents in and for Porsche, as well as his eye for art in his Porsche-dominated photography. Some of his images are found to the left of the inside back cover of our Panorama magazines. Of particular interest to Barb and me was a photo of his white 1953 356 in front of an old barn lit by a single light after a healthy snow storm. So pure. So simple.

So, it follows that these men decided to not just put rows of cars to be seen.

The object was to highlight Porsches staged to accentuate their lines, their beauty, amid light and shadows, colors, forms, etc. To place them with an artistic eye around a picturesque location. Backdrops have included Universal Studios, the docks at San Pedro and Long Beach, California. A lumber yard produced interesting juxtapositions of cars and stacks of wood. Last year the setting was near a wharf in San Francisco. Very industrial ... often the opposite from the curves from Stuttgart.



For 2024, the norm of Luft (air-cooled Porsches only) on Saturday and Air & Water on Sunday became a new one-day event called Air & Water. On April 27 in Costa Mesa, California, it took place at the Orange County Fairgrounds. About half of the 130 acres were very cool buildings and lawns with the other half being a huge parking lot. Air & Water was by itself this time because over 1000 cars were anticipated. There was an auction with about 65 cars sold. There was a display with 'albino' (white Porsches only). There was a special dirt area for Porsche off-roading. There were camping options on the roofs on Macans, Cayennes, and 911s. There were race cars ... rare Porsches ... and Porsches with unique, never-before-seen paint jobs. Unknown was how many spectators would attend. We heard that there were estimates varying from 11,000 to over 15,000! Entry was \$50 per person. Over 23 countries were represented. Can you say overload?

To take this fun trip to the next level, Barb and I were joined by Rich Kepner, our nephew, Neil, and his 17-year-old son, Jack, from Las Vegas. Neil arranged for an Airbnb which turned out to be a spectacular success compared with all of us staying at the "Headquarters Hotel." Not to mention the obvious monetary savings compared with three rooms at the

Hilton, we had a full kitchen, three bedrooms, three bathrooms and a big garage. Did I mention it was one mile from the Fairgrounds? Rooms were perfect, and the kitchen and fridge were made for dispensation of chips, dip, beer, left over bacon, and copious amounts of margaritas. Working just feet from said kitchen, all goodies were brought out to the garage. "Honey, while you're up ... ya wanna bring more ... Oh just bring the whole bottle." Never had So Old been worked on by five so relaxed people! I have to confess ... I took advantage of Jack. He could do the wheels and tires. His knees aren't 76 years old. Actually, I think I only polished the roof. I only had to stoop for my margarita.

Neil reserved tables at restaurants because he had experience with the Newport area, so dinners were wonderful. A great trip not only for cars, but foods and drinks. We did breakfasts, lunches and Happy Hours at the house, but, oh, those dinners.

Saturday saw us in line to be guided in at 8:00 a.m. – not knowing that 500 were already parked inside. Yes, we ended up in the South 40 parking lot, with row after row



of parked cars. BUT ... were lucky enough to be parked prominently, on the end, and perpendicular to the rows. We were one of the first cars seen by people coming out of one of the inside displays. Not staged in the cool kids' areas, but pretty good nevertheless. I felt sorry for those parked at the far end. Even I didn't venture that far.



Luft is supposed to be scheduled for later this year, though no specific date or location has been announced. Do I want the five of us to do this all over again? Oh, you know I do. Seventeen-year-old Jack was more than blown away, experiencing his first Porsche extravaganza, but expressed how it was even better because of all the fun the five of us enjoyed. He was right ... 1000 cars ... but hasn't it always been more than just about the cars?



BubbaBy Barb Crowley

(Note: Neil and Jack are referenced in Dennis Crowley's article about Air and Water. Neil is Bubba's son and Jack is Bubba's grandson. This article was originally published in the April 2010 issue of the ZN. We thought our members might enjoy reading it again. It is nice to know my brother's passion about Porsches continues in his descendants. Barb)

My brother was a Porsche enthusiast ever since he was a little boy. (Weren't most of you?) He even named one of his beloved dalmatians "Porsche." He had owned more cars than I can recall. His only Porsche, however, was a lovely black 2001 996 Carrera Cabriolet that he enjoyed the last years of his life.

His given name was "William." To most, he was "Bill." To our family he will always be "Bubba." He passed away just before Christmas, 2009. Too young...just three years older than I. His lung cancer made him weak. His cataracts and detached retina compromised his sight and made it impossible for him to drive his Porsche. But he still wanted to experience the thrill of it one more time and asked Dennis to take him for a little "joy ride" on the Mt. Lemmon highway. It gave him a muchneeded respite from his predicament. Bubba couldn't see much that day...but his other senses benefited. He enjoyed the sound of the revs of the engine, the sun on his face, and the wind in what hair he had left.

He wore his red corduroy Porsche baseball cap day in and day out...indoors, outdoors, awake or asleep. It kept his head warm. We had planned on putting a Porsche emblem on his newly acquired cherry red scooter from the Scooter Store...but sadly, we didn't do it in time.

We knew that <u>he</u> knew his "situation" was dire when he started giving away some of his prized possessions. We were honored when he asked Dennis and me if we would like to have his red JNF 356 Porsche toy. We had always admired it…but had never heard the story behind it until he handed it over to us with teary eyes. It explains a lot about my brother and his passion for cars…especially the Porsche marque.

The story began in Stuttgart, Germany, in the early '50s. Our dad, who was in the Air Force, was stationed there after WWII. He and my eight-year-old, towheaded brother visited the Porsche Factory. Bubba was impressed that just the two of them had a private guided

tour. There was a gift shop on the premises, and he was smitten by a little red 356 wind-up toy. He HAD to have it. So, he saved and saved all his miniscule allowances and his nickels and dimes from doing chores. Finally, he had saved enough to go back to the factory, and he purchased his treasure.

As we were growing up, I remember seeing the Porsche in his bedroom. What I don't remember is ever seeing him play with it. The toy was always displayed on a shelf...even after he married. When he had small children of his own...it was just placed on a higher shelf out of the reach of tiny destructive hands.

Now we have it for safe keeping...at least for awhile. Bubba had us promise that when the time came, it would be given to his son...along with this story of the little red toy 356 that meant so much to my brother, Bubba...a Porsche enthusiast and good guy.





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I have just returned from the Porsche Parade in Birmingham, Alabama. We drove 3200 miles roundtrip. I was pleasantly surprised by the weather. I dreaded going due to high heat and high humidity. We were lucky, the hot weather did not kick in until Saturday when Parade was almost over.

Jim and I did a lot of walking. We visited the Birmingham Art Museum, which we thought was excellent, and visited the Barber Vintage Motorcycle Museum. During our off time, we walked the City Walk, took the Magic City Tour and a brewery tour. Red Clay Tours did an amazing job on the two tours we took with them. The bus driver, Clay, was very knowledgeable, friendly and entertaining.

Speed Bump - Slow Down For Some Automotive Tales

Road Trip

I grew up in Stafford, Kansas, a small town in the center of the Sunflower State. Recently I took a road trip back there with two of my three sons. Both have retired at a social security age. Bruce was a Registered Nurse and Brian was a Certified Civil Engineer. A third son, David, a Geologist, was on a business trip to Ireland.

Road trips are full of little vignettes. Here are a few.

Anecdote 1

We drove Brian's new Kia Sportage (long wheel base). We left from Mesa, then up across the rim country to Holbrook where we began following Route 66, now Interstate 40. The Kia cruised nicely at 80-85 miles an hour. It had lots of backseat legroom and I squirrelled up in a corner and enjoyed the guys having a great time trading stories.



"Remember all of those great concerts and shows we were at in the '70 and '80s? Pink Floyd, Rolling Stones, Santana, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Canned Heat, Chuck Berry."

Then there was, "What was your favorite zombie movie?" "How about Night of the Living Dead?" "No way, Dawn of the Dead was worse and I liked Will Smith in I am Legend."

After we went over the Sandia Mountains at Albuquerque, the terrain flattened out and the highway headed straight to Tucumcari, in eastern New Mexico, where we would swing left onto US 54 that takes you into the heartland of Kansas.

Anecdote 2

At one time Tucumcari had been called Six Shooter Siding before being named after the nearby small mountains. Since the Route 66 days it has been a preferred overnight stop. Today, Tucumcari has half a dozen modern motels but many of the other hotels, motels, and restaurants were built in the '40s and '50s, giving Tucumcari a retro feel. The most interesting are the Blue Swallow Motel from 1939 and the two-story Roadrunner Lodge from 1985.

The Roadrunner Lodge began in 1947 as the La Plaza Court and in 1985 merged with the adjacent 1964 Leatherwood Manor. It struggled and closed in 2004. In 2014 David Brenner had a vision - he bought the old 1964 half and renovated the Roadrunner Lodge to become an outstanding, vintage Route 66 icon.

I had the Tiki Room, with mid-century modern furniture and Tiki décor. To keep that '60s vibe there was no coffee maker, fridge or microwave (there was a TV). When you turned on the light switch, the vintage radio played music and ads from the '50s and '60s - Elvis singing "Nothing but a hound dog" followed by an announcer stating that "Chesterfield cigarettes satisfy millions." It had a great bed and bathroom with all the other amenities.

There are two rooms with Magic Fingers installed. Put a quarter in the slot and you get a relaxing massage in bed while you listen to the radio.

The Blue Swallow has been in continuous operation since 1939. Numerous owners have maintained its originality with the same office and L-shaped courtyard. There are 12 rooms with an enclosed garage and colorful metal chairs in front. The rooms are period correct with typical colorful lamps and furniture. Each room has a 1940s era rotary dial phone.

Both motels have an appropriate, road-ready automobile parked at the entrance. Dave Brenner at Roadrunner has a good-as-new American Rambler 220 with 11,600

original miles. The Blue Swallow has a pristine 1957 Hudson Hornet.

The bright neon Blue Swallow Motel sign is recognized world-wide. While I was photographing it, we met people from Wales of Great Britain and three US states traveling Route 66.





Anecdote 3

My paternal grandparents, Mina Wendt and Julius Tretbar, were German immigrants. He homesteaded near Inman, Kansas in 1868 and married Mina in 1876. They had four children: Emma who married a dentist P.J. Pankratz; Julius Gustav (J.G.) who became a dentist; Frederick Wilhelm(F.W.), and my father Johann Julius (J.J.) who both became MDs. Grandfather Julius was found shot dead in the orchard under unknown circumstances and the killer never was found.

The whole family moved to Stafford about 1906 where J.G., and F.W. started the Tretbar Clinic. P.J. was across the street. My father graduated from medical school in 1910 and joined the Clinic a year later. F.W.'s son-in-law, C. Everett Brown, MD, closed the Clinic in 1986.

I still own the Tretbar homestead north of Inman, Kansas, so our road trip took us there. We met with Denny Boerg who is our third-generation farmer. The wheat looked excellent and proved to be 60 bushels per acre. That is outstanding for dry land farming.



We pulled into Stafford on a bright, warm day. It is the quintessential small Kansas town that is trying to survive as the best place to raise a family. When I graduated from high school in 1948, the population was 2000. Now it is 1,000. It has one active business - an oil distribution group. Most of the stores are closed on Mainstreet including the once popular Curtis Cafe. Still open are a general store with groceries, a small café, a pizza place, and a NAPA Automotive. The very popular Ritz movie theater has been upgraded to all digital and shows only the latest films.

Once you get past Main Street, Stafford is an idyllic small midwestern town. The well-kept houses have grassy lawns. The kids play in the streets. There is a Doctor and hospital, a brick Carnegie library with stained glass windows, and the Methodist church that was built in the English Collegiate Gothic style. The schools are excellent, with athletes known as the Trojans. The large grassy park has a swimming pool and new playground equipment.

I was standing with Bruce and Brian in front of the old Tretbar Clinic building when we talked to a lady passing by. She asked me when I graduated from high school. When I told her 1948, she said, "My grandmother, Glennys, was your classmate. My mother closed her flower shop several years ago and now I manage the hospital lab."

A few minutes later Nick Minks drove up and his father Bob walked around the corner. Nick said, "We heard you were in town, so we came to welcome you." Bob had

lived 2 houses away from my parents, J.J. and Gladys, when they built a newer house.

We met 71-year-old Bob at the newer house. He reminded us that he had known my uncles, J.G., and F.W. Tretbar. We then visited the three Tretbar houses two streets away. They are all in very good condition.

It was the end of a glorious road trip when I showed my boys the 1931 house that I grew up in. Fond memories bubbled up and there were tales to be told.




Come Join Us for Breakfast



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
